8:30 a.m. - 6 p.m. Day 1 Bus Tour led by Gary Ecelbarger

Bus Tour Description: We will experience the first phase of the Valley Campaign, from March through April, 1862. We begin with a detailed study of the Battle of Kernstown (March 23), the largest battle fought east of the Alleghenies for 9 months of the war. From there, we head southward, "up" the Valley Pike following Stonewall Jackson's retreating army and its defensive positions, including the scene of the skirmish at Meem's Botton, where Turner Ashby's close call cost him his beautiful horse. Our tour day ends in front of the fifth Stonewall Jackson headquarters house we will view this day, where some of the most momentous decisions were made to set the stage for the rest of the campaign.

This odd, but highly successful, partnership that would last until Ewell's wounding at Second Manassas two months."

At Cross Keys -- a field of battle from an artilleryman's dream -- the two armies brought almost 50 guns into lively play for several hours on June 8, 1862. The battle stands as a near perfect demonstration of how the use, and misuse, of the long arm could determine the results on a Civil War Battlefield.

Bus Tour Description: We will relive the Heart of the Valley Campaign by traversing the beautiful Luray Valley, following the footprints of Stonewall Jackson's "foot cavalry" on its clandestine trip to Front Royal. Then it is an action packed morning and afternoon as we attempt to match the

dizzying pace of encounters from May 23-25, and appreciate its impact on opposing War Departments. Our final trek of the day picks up the pursuit of Jackson by elements of two Union armies, culminating at the exact site of the only general to be killed in action in the 1862 Valley Campaign.

Bus Tour Description: Our final day of touring is a whirlwind of action. We worked

our way to the village of Port Republic to experience the unexpected raid by Union cavalry and artillery upon Stonewall Jackson's HQ on the morning of June 8, 1862. From there it's just a few miles up the historic road for us to relive and analyze the Battle of Cross Keys. Our tour ends during the noon hour with the second battle in consecutive days--the June 9 action at the Wheatfield and Coaling, where over 1,200 men and boys were killed and wounded (with hundreds of others captured) at the Battle of Port Republic.

Speakers & Guides

Gary Ecelbarger Gary Ecelbarger is a leading authority of the 1862 Shenandoah Valley Campaign. He has conducted professional tours within this famous corridor for 25 years, has written 15 articles, essays, and monographs about Valley personalities, battles, and events, and has been involved with preservation and interpretation of this campaign since the 1990s. Among the nine books to his credit, three are dedicated to this 1862 campaign, including Three Days in the Shenandoah: Stonewall Jackson at Front Royal and Winchester (University of Oklahoma Press, 2008). His future works will include a book dedicated to the final three weeks of this campaign.

Michael C. Harris is a graduate of the University of Mary Wash-ington and the American Military University. He has worked for the National Park Service, New Jersey State Parks and the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission. His Brandywine: A Military History of the Battle that Lost Philadelphia but Saved America, from which his article in Hallowed Ground magazine adapted, is available from Savas Beatie publishers.

Bill Miller is an award-winning author who has been researching, writing, speaking and preserving Civil War history for more than 40 years. A retired teacher, he now focuses on Shenandoah Valley history and leads public and private tours of the Valley's battlefields.

Frank O'Reilly is a Historian for the Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania County Battlefields Memorial National Military Park with eight videos in the C-SPAN Video Library.

A life-long student of military history, Scott C. Patchan is a graduate of James Madison University in the Shenandoah Valley. He is the author of many articles and books, including The Forgotten Fury: The Battle of Piedmont (1996), Shenandoah Summer: The 1864 Valley Campaign (2007), and Second Manassas: Longstreet's Attack and the Struggle for Chinn Ridge (2011) His book "The Last Battle of Winchester," was published in 2013. He most recent work is "Worthy of a Higher Rank: The 1864 Journal of Colonel Joseph Thoburn," 2021. Patchan has served as a Director on the board of the Kernstown Battlefield Association in Winchester, Virginia, and as a member of the Shenandoah Valley Battlefield Foundation's Resource Protection Committee. He was twice president of Bull Run Civil War Round Table and is active with the Shenandoah Valley Battlefield Foundation in many capacities.

Don Pfanz is a staff historian at Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park. A native of Gettysburg, Pa., Pfanz graduated from the College of William & Mary in Williamsburg in 1980, then joined the National Park Service. Prior to joining the Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park staff, Don served at Petersburg National Battlefield and Fort Sumter National Monument. He has written two books: Abraham Lincoln at City Point and Richard S. Ewell: A Soldier's Life.
